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PART 5 Expo Delight--A Rendezvous to Remember with Global Guests The lowering of the World Expo Shanghai flag on the evening of October 31, 2010, marked the conclusion of the successful, splendid, unforgettable World Expo Shanghai, which more than fulfilled all its commitments. Among the 73.09 million Expo visitors during its 184-day duration were more than 100 foreign heads of state and political figures. Shanghai's total 1.03 million-influx of visitors was its largest ever. The Expo acted as a diplomatic arena that enhanced foreigners' understanding of China, and forged profound friendships among global citizens. The unforgettable 184-day experience is now part of World Expo history. Visitors, workers, volunteers, and ordinary Shanghai folks will remember forever the part they played in this super event, the people they met and their experiences. After trial operations began on April 20, more than 70,000 volunteers worked in the Expo Park, 100,000 at civil service stations and 1.97 million throughout the streets and communities of Shanghai. They stayed at their posts through 40-degree Celsius heat and thunderstorms, and daily handled a 1.03 million visitor-flow. Their dedication and persistence personified China's confidence and pleasure in playing host to this world event. Smiles in reaction to amazing performances and amusing incidents were everywhere at the Expo Park. Maori culture was the focus of the New Zealand Pavilion. The roof garden was festooned with Maori sculptures of various sizes, and Maori performers invited visitors to join them in the war-like Maori dance. Blue-clad workers in the USA Pavilion presented a "Learn the Shanghai Dialect" activity. The subtle differences between this southern idiom and the Mandarin spoken throughout China produced some howlers. The portfolio of one photographer included a smile-file, which he regards as his most precious Expo memento. The upside for people waiting patiently in line--often for as long as five or six hours--to enter Expo pavilions was that it gave them the chance to make new friends and compare expo tour experiences. The "Welcome to the World Expo 2010 Shanghai" slogan in red characters over Expo entrances gave an impression on the closing day of reluctance to end the happy event. Hundreds of thousands of tourists still immersed in the joy of the Expo lingered to watch song and dance performances at the various pavilions.

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
