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Whether you call it guilt or a self-imposed sense of responsibility, men usually suffer more when home cuts into work. Men still tend to define themselves more than females in terms of success at work, says Geoffrey Greif, associate dean of the University of Maryland's School of Social Work. "It's hard to let go of the idea that success is defined as success at work versus doing a good job as a father." To their wives who want to know why they aren't home for dinner, the career-loving men will say: "It's not like I'm on the golf course. I was at the office until 11 p.m. working for our family." And the wives can say: "But aren't you doing what you want to do? Didn't we have a feminist revolution? Don't close to a fourth of women earn more than their husbands? Yes, but even today it's hard to find a chief executive's wife who has a career." In this confusing environment, some men are starting to rethink their priorities. Sometimes it's because they want to be closer to their kids than their distant 1950s dads were to them. Or sometimes they change unwillingly, pushed by their wives to spend more time on family matters. Whatever the reasons, combine them with a tight labor market, technology that allows employees to work from home and a younger generation of chief executives, and you're seeing the beginnings of change in the corporate workplace. Harry Kraemer is part of this new generation. He woke up to the problem three years ago when Baxter, which manufactures medical products, surveyed employees and found that conflicts between work and home were roiling the company. Surprisingly, even more men than women reported feeling stress. Look at the gender split: 49% of men versus 39% of women said they were looking for a new job because of work/life conflicts. . . .

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
